





India missing 63m women as parents still favour boys

India's gender imbalance is so skewed by parents' preference for boys that the female population is about 63 million fewer than it ought to be and 21 million baby girls are unwanted by their families, officials have concluded.

Illegal abortions of female foetuses, neglect of young girls within their families, poor nutrition and shoddy education have left a shortfall in India's population of 1.3 billion, according to the government's annual economic survey.

The report urged the nation to confront its "societal preference for boys" but conceded that the phenomenon dated back thousands of years and may be irreversible.

Even India's status as an emerging economic superpower had had a mixed impact on gender equality, the survey found. Indian women broadly received a better education than in the past and had gained greater influence over decision-making within their households as the nation's wealth had grown. Yet

the proportion of women employed outside the home had slipped to 24 per cent in 2015-16 from 36 per cent a decade earlier, because rising incomes among men had enabled wives to withdraw from the workforce.

A United Nations report in 2013 uncovered a decline in India's gender balance, to 919 girls for every 1,000 boys. India has long grappled with the issue, which is blamed for many social ills, including its dismal record on sexual violence.

Pre-determining the sex of an unborn child was banned across India in 1994 to prevent the mass abortion of female foetuses. The practice remains a thriving covert business, however, and improvements in pre-natal technology have made it easier to break the law. An investigation in Delhi found dozens of clinics suspected of carrying out illegal ultrasound scans and abortions, with one hospital delivering only 285 girls for every 1,000 boys.

The economic survey made clear that millions of Indian girls who escaped abortion were born into families that did not want them. The report said that "families where a son is born are more likely to stop having children than families where a girl is born".

Couples often keep having children until they have a son and then funnel greater resources to him than to his sisters. Studies show that girls receive less education, have poorer nutrition and get less medical help than boys.


"The challenge of gender is long-standing, probably going back millennia," wrote Arvind Subramanian, chief economic adviser and the author of the report. The report noted that increasing wealth had not dented the broad preference for males, with some comparatively wealthy areas, including Delhi, faring worse over the years.

Better levels of women's development were found in the northeast of India, which the report described as "a model for the rest of the country".

Commentators noted that the region was ethnically closer to China and Burma, however, including many people who scarcely identified themselves as Indian.







She was found dead on Saturday with 19 serious injuries to her body - which police say indicate she was tortured.
